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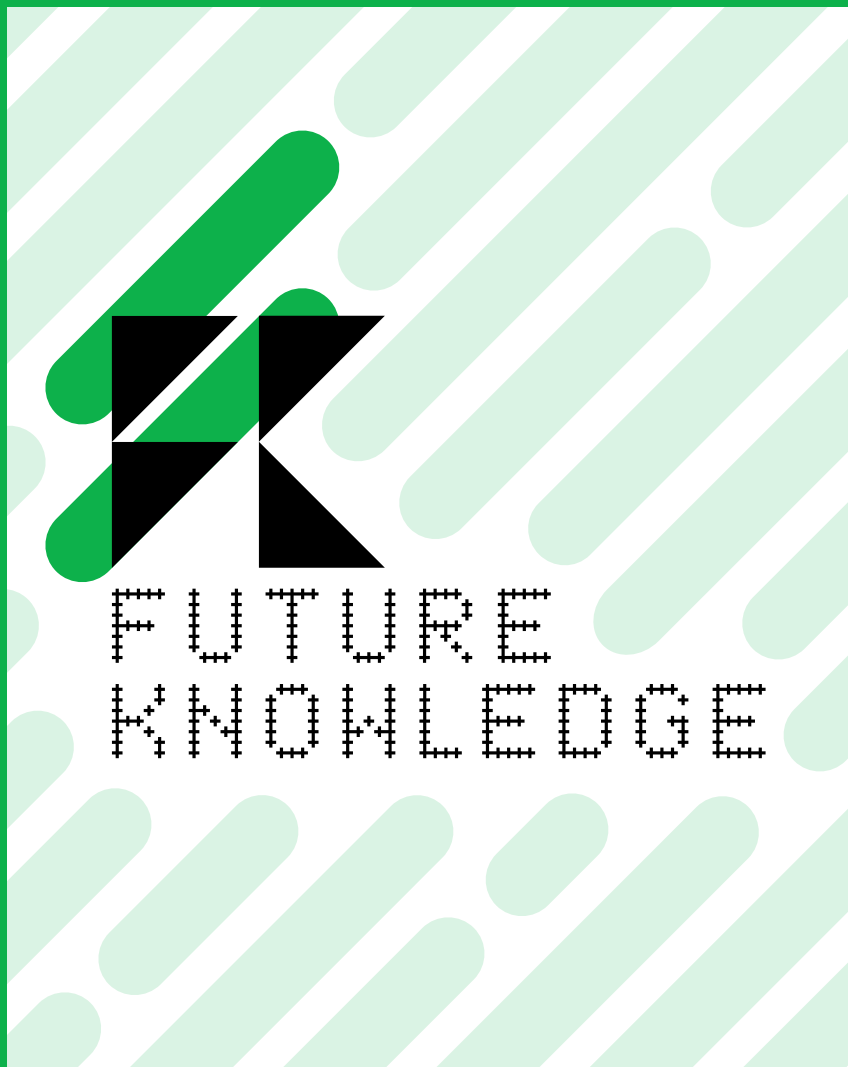

WELCOME

Welcome to the autumn programme at Modern Art Oxford.

Our main exhibition *Future Knowledge* celebrates the role of creativity in generating solutions to the earth's problems. From showcasing the ingenuity of biomimicry, to displaying thought-provoking work by artists who explore climate change in their practice, *Future Knowledge* investigates the role of artistic enquiry in generating creative responses to environmental issues.

The new academic year sees the return of our annual exhibition celebrating and supporting graduate artists. The Platform Graduate Award is a series of three solo exhibitions by selected graduates from Oxford Brookes University, University of Reading and The Ruskin School of Art, University of Oxford.

We welcome back the Shadowlight Artists who last exhibited at the gallery in 2016. The group showcase their increasingly ambitious work as a disability arts collective in this exhibition split across two venues, Arts at the Old Fire Station and Modern Art Oxford.

Future Knowledge is a thought-provoking exhibition exploring the role of visual culture in continuing to raise awareness of the effects of climate change. Building upon last year's inaugural edition (20 May – 25 June 2017), this exhibition brings together artworks, prototypes and projects by artists, designers and thinkers from a range of different disciplines, in order to showcase fascinating and diverse creative responses to environmental concerns.

This dynamic show begins with an aerial performance by dancer and choreographer Eve Mutso on the evening of the Preview Party. The marks she makes with her pointe shoes in graphite powder will remain in situ as a floor drawing as part of the first section of the exhibition, which reflects on the interconnectedness of all living beings over a vast timescale.

Moving through the exhibition visitors will be introduced to environmental innovations, revealing new site-specific methods for understanding our domestic and local relationships to systems of production, systematic waste, and inadvertent pollution.

The final gallery space will be used as a public studio, demonstrating ingenuity in the face of climate change through prototypes, new biomimicry designs and innovative materials, as well as hosting events and activities that invite visitors to join in. Shadowlight Artists: *Rising*

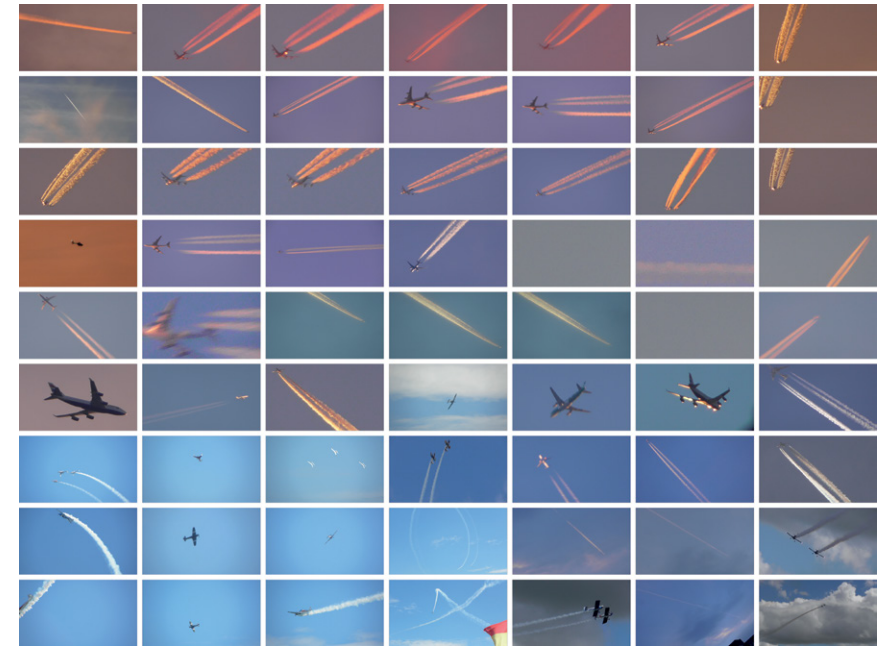
In this exhibition across two venues, Modern Art Oxford and Arts at the Old Fire Station, the Shadowlight Artists showcase work spanning installation, painting, digital media and theatrical production. Film Oxford produced the latest works by the group, working in collaboration with them over the last 18 months. The exhibition celebrates the group's creative growth since their formation in 2009 with an artistically ambitious body of work which re-frames disability arts.

Rising features major new works by the core members alongside two new films produced by the Shadowlight Associates. Mark Hemsworth's large-scale prints reflect his obsession

with collecting images; while a new installation by Richard Hunt moves his painting practice into the realms of multimedia installation. A new animation by Tom Breach merges autobiographical experience with fantasy; and Lucy Skuce's video installation blends her fascination with construction and the domestic environment. Danny Smith's new film merges his interest in ancestral memory and the cultures of prehistory.

As part of the latest work by the group, Shadowlight artist Russell Highsmith's play *Singles Night* will be on at Arts at the Old Fire Station on 19 and 20 September. Book your tickets at oldfirestation.org.uk.

Biomimicry Workshop **Sunday 14 October, 2.30–4.30pm**

Learn from Michael Pawlyn, one of the world's leading biomimicry architects, about the ingenious creative methods behind biomimicry. In this fascinating and playful workshop for adults, gain fresh ways of understanding how human creativity can work practically with natural systems to build more adaptive and sustainable buildings.

Early Years Workshops: Make Play **Thursdays 27 September, 4, 11, 18 & 25 October, 11am–12pm & 1–2pm**

Make Play sessions offer a sensory creative space for children age 6 months to 5 years to explore with their parent/carer. Drawing on materials and themes within our exhibitions, each week offers different experimental activities

to help participants follow their curiosity and be playful.

Inspired by *Future Knowledge* these sessions will explore life cycles of materials and take place in the Piper Gallery.

Big Draw Workshop: Lichen Life **Saturday 13 October, 1–4pm**

Join artist Sarah Blissett for this special climate change-inspired workshop to explore the role of playfulness in creativity, invention and discovery. Learn how tiny lichen organisms reveal fascinating facts about air pollution, paint your own lichen life portraits, examine the secret microscopic world and landscapes of lichens, and create your own growing living lichen sculpture.

Sarah Blissett is a writer, artist and researcher at Roehampton University working at intersections between performance, art and ecology.

On the opening night of *Future Knowledge*, dancer and choreographer Eve Mutso will dip her pointe shoes in graphite powder and dance across a canvas on the floor, suspended from the gallery ceiling, to represent the physical mark one individual can make on the world.

Eve Mutso is a freelance dancer and choreographer and former Principal Dancer of Scottish Ballet, Scotland's national dance company. *loop* was originally commissioned by The Fruitmarket Gallery, Edinburgh.

Penny Woolcock: *Fantastic Cities* 17 November 2018 – 3 March 2019

Fantastic Cities is a major solo exhibition of artist and director Penny Woolcock (b. 1950, Buenos Aires, lives in London), an unparalleled pioneer in contemporary visual culture in the UK. Woolcock is widely

celebrated for her creatively incisive approach to exploring issues of social inequality. Her award winning work centres on personal stories of experiences within urban communities.

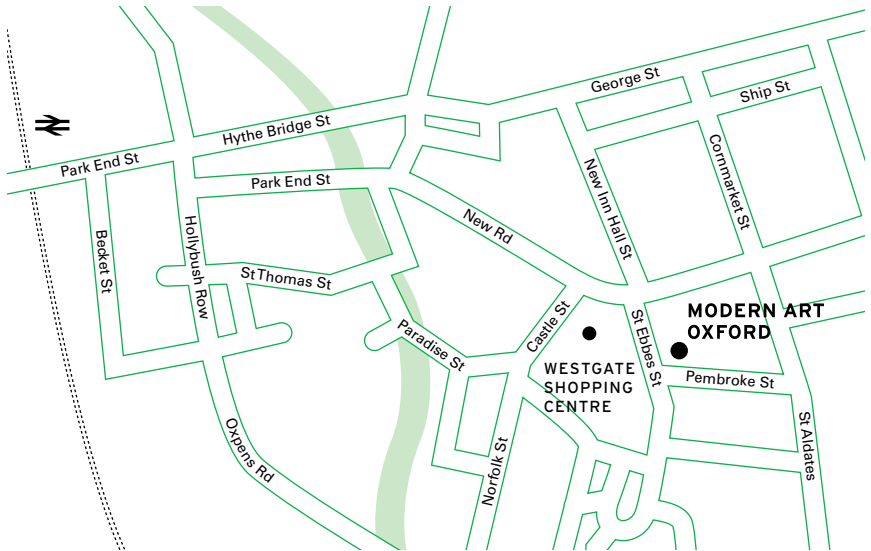
